D Day 80th Commemoration at St.David's Church,

On the 6th June, St.David's brought together people from across the four parishes and the local community to join in the national commemoration of the 80th Anniversary of D-Day. The church was lit up in the colours of the Union Flag both inside and out and bunting adorned the rails and church front. The usual copious amounts of food were served up – thanks to Audrey and Ruth Howard and all those who baked and provided other refreshments – and there was music playing from the 1940s to get us literally, In The Mood, interspersed by readings about D-Day. At 9 pm we all went out into the church yard overlooking the beacon, where our commemoration service was held. The Battle of Britain March rang out across the countryside before the Official Proclamation was read by Adrian Burrows.

At 9.15pm the Beacon was lit by Mark and Judith Bowes, the flames providing the Light of Peace as we joined in with the thousands of beacons and lamps being lit to mark the anniversary.

Ann Nicholas gave the International Tribute before we had the moving "Shores Of Normandy" written and performed by Jim Radford – he was only 15 when he arrived on the Normandy coast and was the youngest known member of the armed forces to arrive on that day.

The commemoration closed with the hymn Jerusalem, followed by God Save the King.

The speaker was Hazel Griffiths, who works on cruise ships, lecturing about the ports of call for the passengers. Hazel first researched Eva Peron when she was on a ship due to dock in Buenos Aires, the capital of Argentina. There, Eva became a heroine to the people, and a World famous First Lady when her husband Juan Peron became President. Most of us know Eva as the subject of the Andrew Lloyd Webber / Tim Rice musical, Evita, and the film of the musical starring Madonna as Eva Peron.

As you can imagine, there was much more to her life story than the musical could ever include. Her name was changed when she was a child because her father and mother were not married, and he had another family. She eventually chose the name of Evita herself, it means little Eva, and she was her mother's youngest child. In a similar way she re-invented herself with hard work, ambition and confidence. Unfortunately, she fell ill with cervical cancer and died at the height of her success and power.

No matter what we may think of her politics or wealth she was an influential and adored woman at a time when politics was not usually associated with women, her life fascinating, strange and a great subject for our evening.

We ended the evening, as ever, with lots of cakes and teas!


There is no Walk in August




Messy Church at Acton

The evening was filled with many contrasting styles of music and included: some original, gentle compositions from John Rawlin Silvers and Elfin Bow; Baroque and Classical pieces from Caroline Morris and Jane Alcock and a novel instrumental collaboration from Jane Alcock and John Rowell, mixing various wind instruments with John's six-string fretless bass.

We would like to thank everyone who came to support Mary's Meals and also all those who donated, but couldn't manage to be there on the night. The evening raised a fantastic amount, £2,000. This corresponds to 93 children receiving a nutritious meal each school day for a whole school year! This life-changing meal encourages hungry children into school, where they can have the energy to learn and develop, and hopefully have an opportunity to escape from a life of poverty. Donations continue to drift in and it looks as if we will actually be able to bring the number of children fed up to the 100 mark. This is such an achievement!

Very special thanks to everyone involved; to Stephan for his compering skills and organisational role; to the team providing refreshments so effectively; to those who organised the raffle and provided prizes; to those helping with parking, ticket sales, publicity and all the jobs that lead to a successful event.

It was also nice to welcome Hannah, from Mary's Meals, and have her on hand to discuss and promote the valuable work of the charity.

I get the lovely job of bottle feeding and when the children from the farm are around I am never short of help and we do have many discussions about names.

The Apostles; St Jude

Jude is often identified as Thaddaeus to distinguish him from Judas Iscariot. He is often termed the brother of Jesus but is more likely to be a cousin to Jesus. He is believed to have been born in Paneas in Galilee, his father being Clopas and his mother Mary Clopas, sister to the Virgin Mary. In the Catholic Church he is believed to be the brother of Jesus.

He spoke Greek and Aramaic, as did many of the people born in Galilee. Little is written concerning his life in the Biblical early scripts, although he is said to be the author of 'The Epistle of Jude'. He may also have been the bridegroom in the account of the wedding in Cana, where Jesus turned the water into wine, His first miracle in the Bible.

Jude was said to be present at Pentecost and is often depicted as having the flame of the Holy Spirit around his head.

After the death of Jesus he started to preach, starting in Judea and then moving further away to Samaria, Syria, Mesopotamia and Libya. He travelled to Armenia, introducing Christianity to that country, where he is the Patron Saint. He travelled to Beirut, where he was martyred in about 65 AD with an axe, alongside Simon the Zealot. An ossuary in Northern Israel, dated to the early 2nd Century, was found with the inscription Judas Thaddaeus. His body is said to have been held in Kyrgyzstan until the mid-15th Century.

On 28th October 1665 his body was taken to Rome, where he was placed in the crypt at St. Peter's Basilica under the altar of St. Joseph, together with the bones of Simon the Zealot. In later years an arm was removed and placed in a carved reliquary in the shape of an arm imparting a blessing. This relic was toured in the USA over the past year. Jude is the Patron Saint of lost causes, a title derived from Christian reluctance to use the name Judas because of Judas Iscariot. He therefore became very keen to intercede to help people, even those who were in dire or hopeless circumstances. No matter what is happening, he will come to our aid.

A letter of Introduction

Churches Together in Nantwich From the Revd. Canon David Taylor 12th June 2024



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ

You will be aware from the May Minutes that I was elected as Chairman of CTiN for the next two years. I offered to help in this way because it was clear at the last AGM that no one was willing or able to step into Andrew Spiers' place. As a recently retired church minister I felt that I could give some time to this and this was welcomed by the meeting in May.

So let me introduce myself. My wife Anne and I moved to Nantwich in 2019 following my retirement as Rector of the Parish of Congleton. We now worship at St Mary's Nantwich and I have permission to officiate within the Diocese of Chester. I was brought up within the Church of England and came to personal faith as a teenager. On leaving university I became a teacher of modern languages in Co. Durham before being called to train for ordained ministry in Salisbury. I was ordained in 1993 at Chester Cathedral and have served in parishes within the Chester Diocese ever since. Throughout my life and ministry I have been privileged to meet and learn from Christians of different traditions within my own and other denominations, from Catholic to charismatic and all stations in between. Churches Together has featured in different ways throughout my ministry and I am delighted to be able to serve Churches Together in Nantwich in this way over the next two years.

In his last days on earth Jesus prayed for the unity of those who would follow him and St Paul encourages us to "make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace" (Ephesians 4:3). The purpose of CTiN is to play our part in making this possible here in Nantwich. We have different traditions, different ways of organising ourselves, different ways of understanding our faith. We may disagree on matters great and small but we are called to "make every effort" to hold fast to that unity which we have in Christ through the Holy Spirit. This is all the more important at a time when our society (indeed our world) is becoming more fractious and fractured. In my view we can do this by sharing in prayer and worship, through witness and through service to the wider community. We can support one another's efforts by sharing news and offering prayer and we can work together as churches and individuals.

I am looking forward to getting to know you and your church communities in the coming months. May God bless us in our endeavours,



From our meeting in May here are some matters for your prayers and for action. Please share these with others in your churches through whatever means you use week by week. Other church news can be found with the Minutes of the May meeting. The General Election (4th July in case you haven't heard!!)

Pray for our community and for those who seek to serve as Members of Parliament. Pray also for those who are eligible to vote that we will not give way to cynicism or disillusion but will exercise our right to choose our representatives thoughtfully and prayerfully.

WI AGM

The National Women's Institute AGM at the Royal Albert Hall

Whilst members of Darnhall and Wettenhall WI were sitting down to their speaker for the evening, Marjorie Sherry was sitting in the bar at the Hyatt Hotel awaiting dinner.

This year it was Darnhall and Wettenhall's turn to represent three Cheshire WI's at the AGM to vote on a resolution about dentistry.

The meeting was taking place at the Royal Albert Hall in London. The adventure started at Middlewich early on Tuesday morning when Marjorie joined other delegates on the coach.

On the Wednesday morning members had another early start to reach the Royal Albert Hall and Cheshire delegates were to be seated about 10 rows from the front of the hall in the main arena almost opposite the organ. Well, that is awesome if nothing else. The meeting started with the singing of Jerusalem accompanied by the organ.

Following this were various introductions and speakers.

The speaker for the dental resolution was Eddie Crouch, who has been seen on various TV interviews discussing the problems of Dental Health and the NHS. Members asked various questions on the subject and, since the WI had been unable to find someone to speak against the resolution, the vote was taken. Of the 4795 institutes able to vote, 4578 were in favour of the resolution.

The guest speakers all spoke about abuse of women in various concepts. The morning speaker was Nazir Afzal OBE, who was Chief Crown Prosecutor for NW England during the cases of Stuart Hall and the huge enquiry in Rochdale. His first-hand knowledge of what goes on behind closed doors, and within families, was very disturbing.

The first speaker in the afternoon was Mel Brown i.e. Mel B of the Spice Girls. It took the form of an interview with Victoria Derbyshire and was very revealing. She said that her experiences will never really leave her. She has now written about her life so far.

The last guest speaker was Timothy Watson, who was in the Archers and took the part of a very controlling, coercive, farm manager. Together with Melissa Green he explained how very difficult it was to read the part and to collect the background information. Following the Archers storyline the subject was taken up by television.

The Women's Aid celebrates its 50th anniversary this year but it is sad that this is still needed today. Abuse takes many forms, in many ways, and maybe we should be more aware that it can be well hidden. This applies especially in rural areas where there is less social contact.

Recipe

Salmon with a Pea and Mint Salad Serves 2

Ingredients

- 5 2 salmon fillets
- Frozen or fresh peas about 1 mug of peas.
- About a third of a cucumber
- Handful of fresh mint finely chopped
- 2tbsp white wine or cider vinegar
- Pinch each of salt, pepper and sugar
- 5 2-3 tbsp mayonnaise



Method

- Cook the salmon fillets in an oven [160 C or mark 6 gas] or under a hot grill, on a greased tray, until just cooked through. Test after about 8 10 minutes. Leave to cool on the tray
- For the salad first cook the peas in boiling water until just tender this will only be about 1-2 minutes for frozen peas. Drain the peas and leave to cool slightly.
- In a wide bowl pour in the vinegar, oil and pepper, salt and sugar. Add the mint and stir to mix. Add the warm peas and mix gently into the liquids. Allow to cool completely. Cut the cucumber into three pieces, each about 5 cm long. Cut these pieces into slim sticks. Add the cucumber to the peas and mix gently. Leave for about 15 minutes.
- Place lettuce leaves on two plates and spoon the drained pea and cucumber mixture onto the leaves, leaving any liquid in the bowl. Add the mayonnaise to the remaining liquid in the bowl and stir well to mix. Place the salmon fillets on top of the peas and drizzle the mayonnaise mixture over the fish. Add tomatoes to the plate.

A vegetarian salad can be made in the same way, replacing the salmon with hard boiled eggs


